SAM's Snippets by Sheila ("S.A.M.") Shrestha

"Spontaneous" Art. It's the time of year again when IAC artists



hastily prepare for the club's annual holiday arts and crafts show. True to form, so did I, having started really late this year due to other heavy summer commitments.

When there is sun and warmth, I almost always focus on doing heliotropes, i.e. sun paintings, on silk. Besides the obvious sun, it's best that the sun is rather intense, and there should be low wind velocity so the patterns (professionally called "masks") will not blow off during the procedure. Realizing that these ideal days were nearing a close, I found myself stressing out more than usual.

I am a rather spontaneous painter and do my best work when I follow my feelings and make daring, intuitive, split-second decisions. The heliotrope process goes right along with my nature because it must be done quickly to prevent the dyes from drying until they have a chance to develop adequately. To accomplish this, I have modified my technique over time in that I use the silk scarf directly as a palette and allow the colors to intermix while the action is going on. I depend on my instincts to

apply the dyes in unusual, somewhat risky combinations. The dyes spreading on the silk with the overlying masks form the designs. A water spray bottle and container of salt are key



components in this technique. It looks weird but I wear a sun hat and an old lab coat, with a container of salt in one pocket and stone mask weights in the other. My left hand wields the spray bottle and the right a brush.

My appearance is reminiscent of "Quick Draw McGraw". For those who may be too young to remember, McGraw was a cartoon horse that had human characteristics and wore a cowboy hat with a bandana around his neck.



As my story goes, during one of these painting frenzy days, I was in my studio, frantically



hovering over a silk scarf stretched onto a wooden stretcher frame with stainless steel push pins. I accidentally (but forcefully) knocked a full spray bottle onto the floor resulting in a loud crash. Having lost its neck, the bottle made a pfft/pfft/splish sound and then permitted a torrent

of water to quickly form on the floor. Because I had reached the point of no return in the dyeing process, I was not able to "address" the "mess". Ignoring the catastrophe, I proceeded to reach into my pocket to grab some salt to apply to the silk. That's when I discovered that after completing a previous piece, I had mistakenly left some of the push pins in the salt. OUCH! Did I ever get the point! Now my fingers were bleeding too. I wondered if that qualified as "mixed media"? Nevertheless, I told myself to stop "horsing" around and go for a meaty finish.



When I finally got to the point that I was able to carry the piece out into the sun, I placed the "works" on top of two lawn chairs which I had set outside at a pre-measured distance so they could support the frame and allow the silk to "cook" properly. After a period of time, I checked the finished product. Lo and behold, it turned out so nicely that I considered it to be one of my best pieces. Go figure.

My takeaway thoughts are that art may need adjustments along the way but all can come out well. Indeed, spontaneous creativity may possibly result in some of the best art, whether fine art, writings, dance or musical compositions. Loosen up, hoof it and go for the

gusto. Gallop into new territory and see where it takes you. You may be surprised!

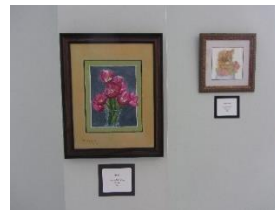

TUESDAY EVENING MEETING/OCTOBER



Stained-Glass Art by Valerie O'Hara (Hermance Chapel, St. John Fisher College)

Stained-glass artist **VALERIE O'HARA** will give a presentation entitled "Pike Stained Glass Studios at 110 Years Old" at the October 22, 2019 meeting of the Irondequoit Art Club to be held 7:30 PM at Chapel Oaks, St. Ann's Community, 1550 Portland Ave., Rochester, NY 14621, after the club's 7 PM business meeting. (Enter St. Ann's Campus and bear left following signs to the main entrance of Chapel Oaks.) There is no charge for this event and the site is accessible to all.

Valerie's PowerPoint presentation will cover a brief history of stained glass and a history of the studio with several examples of their work. The studio's latest projects are: 12 new 5 1/2 ft. x 14 ft. windows for the Hermance Chapel at St. John Fisher College in Rochester, NY and 23 windows for the new St. Pius X Church in Rochester. Several churches in upstate New York have two and three generations of Pike work in the same building, including: Christ Church, Corning, Holy Sepulchre Cemetery, Rochester and Zion Episcopal Church, Avon. They design, create and restore stained glass windows in their 4,000 square foot

studio, centrally located in downtown Rochester.

The studio has made windows for institutions such as: Colgate Divinity School, Rochester, Cornell University's Sage Chapel, and Princeton University's Chapel. Pike Stained Glass Studios is among the oldest stained-glass studios in the country. Founded in 1908 by William Pike, and continued in 1948 by James and Norma Lee O'Hara, Pike's nephew and wife, the studio has been directed by Valerie O'Hara, their daughter, and William Pike's grand-niece, since 1987.

Valerie O'Hara had the unique opportunity to be raised in a stained-glass studio. From the age of 12, she apprenticed at the studio after school, learning from her parents, who were both accomplished artists, and renaissance individuals. Her mother, Norma Lee, sewed the costumes that were worn by the models, who posed for the figures in the windows. Her father took photographs of the costumed models, developed the film and printed the pictures in their home darkroom, before using them to draw the cartoons (full size drawings) for the windows. Everyone takes their turn at posing - employees, relatives and friends alike!

Aside from all of her education and training not available in today's academic settings, Valerie graduated from the Rochester Institute of Technology, earning a Bachelor of Fine Arts Degree in 1976. She majored in painting and minored in glass and woodworking through the School for American Craftsmen.

In addition to commissioned work, Valerie creates paintings and glass sculptures, many of which have been exhibited and won awards throughout North America. Her work has been featured in the following publications: American Craft Magazine, Glass Magazine, Glass Studio Magazine, Lighting and Design Application Magazine,

Rochester Magazine, and Women's Day Magazine.

Valerie has taught and given presentations to many groups on the art, craft and history of stained glass, including a segment in the WXXI public television station's series entitled "Crafts by Hand", as well as: The Glass Art Society, The Naples Mill School of Arts and Crafts, The Rochester Institute of Technology's School for American Craftsmen, The Strong Museum and The Landmark Society of Western New York, from which she has won two awards: A Special Achievement Award in 1998 and Craftsperson of the Year Award in 2006

She maintains professional affiliations with Preservation League of New York State, Landmark Society of Western New York, Glass Art Society, Interfaith Forum on Religion, Art and Architecture (AIA/PIA), The Association for Preservation Technology International, Partners for Sacred Places, Memorial Art Gallery – consultant for Tiffany Collection, The Arts and Cultural Council of Greater Rochester.
